## **Chapter Corner: Central Los Angeles**

The Central Los Angeles Chapter is one of the smallest chapters, geographically. However, in terms of population it is one of the largest. Combined, the 26 Central L.A. member cities have a population of approximately 5 million residents. They range from Vernon, a city with a population of less than 100, to Los Angeles with over 3.78 million residents.

During the last year, our Central L.A. Chapter has held bi-monthly meetings in conjunction with the South Bay Chapter. Meeting locations usually rotate between the two chapter areas. Joe Aguilar, from Vavrinek, Trine, & Day, was the featured speaker at our first meeting. He discussed key areas in Investment Management, including helping us identify pitfalls in maintaining investment compliance. Most recently, Nikolai Sklaroff, Vice President at Salomon Smith Barney, spoke to us regarding actions that all local agencies can take to improve their bond ratings.

Within the member cities' area, there are several noteworthy capital projects currently under construction. They will soon have a significant physical impact on the area, and an even larger economic effect on the region. The Alameda Corridor Project, a \$2.4 billion undertaking, is consolidating 90 miles of railroad tracks in the Los Angeles basin into a single 20-mile rail and highway corridor connecting the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach to the downtown region. The project is expected to substantially decrease traffic congestion, improve air quality, and facilitate access to the largest port complex in the United States. It is scheduled for completion in 2002.

Few issues have been more controversial in the area than the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) designation of local areas along the Los Angeles River as flood hazard zones subject to a "100-year flood." The designation was accompanied by flood insurance requirements. Fortunately, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is currently raising the banks of the river along the designated area. This will increase the river's capacity and relieve many residents and business owners in this 82 square mile area from the threat of a flood and the requirement for flood insurance. Construction of this project should be completed by mid-2001.

On a local note, the City Of Paramount is currently working with the State, the Coastal Conservancy, the County of Los Angeles, and the Trust for Public Land in expanding and enhancing park space along the Los Angeles River. With the availability of grant funds, we are in the planning stages of adding approximately \$1.2 million worth of land and improvements to our Ralph C. Dills Park, immediately east of the Los Angeles River.

In talking to many of our member cities, there are some constant themes among Finance Departments. As is expected during this time of the year,

away from Pasadena refreshed and motivated to take on another year.

Starting on Saturday February 26th, a pre-conference Workshop entitled, "Leadership for the New Millennium," will be presented presented by Dr. Art Lange, a leading authority and trainer for leadership skills and what it takes to make it in today's competitive work environment. Dr. Lange will engage, entertain and educate you during this four (4) hour pre-conference training event.

Sunday will feature ten different concurrent sessions split between two separate time slots. Ray Adler, a specialist in Communications, from Skillpath Training, will present a twopart series on becoming a better communicator. Ray will take us across the full spectrum of communication, from making a positive first impression to establishing credibility and influencing people. Between these sessions there will be plenty of opportunity to roam through an exhibit hall with an expected 60 to 70 exhibitors. The evening will be capped off with an opening reception at the Athenaeum, a private club on the campus of California Institute of Technology. For those of you who are sports minded, there is golf at Brookside Golf Course and tennis, jogging, biking, etc.

Monday continues a choice of 15 additional sessions broken into three groups. The opening general session will include a motivational speech by Art Berg. Mr. Berg broke his neck in a serious automobile accident in 1983, leaving him a quadriplegic. Today, as author of two books, Some Miracles Take Time and Finding

Peace in Troubled Waters, and President of Invictus Communications, Inc. Art travels more than 200,000 miles a year speaking to professional and civic organizations. His message, The Impossible Just Takes a Little Longer, is simple, yet inspiring and profound. At the luncheon, Speaker Frank Abagnale, on of the world's leading authorities on forgery and embezzlement, will give us a glimpse of his former life as "The Great Imposter". Later in a two-part presentation, Frank will also tell us how to protect our agencies against fraud and other white-collar crime. Other key speakers on Monday include Stephen Gauthier and Girard Miller. Mr Guarhier is GFOA's Technical Services Director. author of the 1994 Governmental Accounting, Auditing and Financial Reporting (GAAFR), otherwise known as the "blue book" and the 1998 GAAFR Update Supplement, will discuss evaluating internal controls and the new GASB 34 which outlines the new reporting model. Mr. Miller, President and CEO of ICMA Retirement Corporation, will return this year to discuss the investment outlook and social security and retirement issues. Monday night ends with a spectacular dinner and entertainment, followed by dancing.

It doesn't stop there. Tuesday offers a selection of five additional sessions. The general session will be lead by Chic Thompson, founder and president of Creative Management Group. Mr. Thompson will give us the tools to become a creative manager and help us "break out of our shells" and unleash the creativity that all of us possess. Girard Miller will return for a concurrent session on Tuesday. The concluding luncheon will feature Brian Lee of Custom Learning Systems Group, with "Thriving on

Change," which is certainly a survival skill that finance officers need in today's municipal government environment.

Because this year's conference is filled with so many exciting and relevant sessions, this year each session will be recorded and audio tapes will be available for purchase in case you can't attend every session that catches your interest.

As you can see, the Conference Committee has put in a lot of time to ensure that you walk away from this conference refreshed, rejuvinated, motivated and educated. DON'T BE LEFT OUT. As conference host, I look forward to welcoming each of you personally to Pasadena.

# Legislative Analyst Releases Budget Projections

The Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) recently released a state budget and economic forecast for fiscal years 1999-00 through 2004-5. The forecast predicts that the 1999-2000 budget reserve will increase from the original estimate of \$881 million to nearly \$2.6 billion. LAO anticipates the reserve will grow again in 2000-01 to \$3 billion and then level out to cover VLF trigger reductions. A copy of the entire report can be found on the LAO website www.lao.ca.gov.

## Wrap-Up of 1999 Legislative Session

Attached to this *Mini-News* is an excerpt from the League of California Cities' 1999 Legislative Wrap-Up Bulletin. Bills passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor regarding the State budget, taxes, bonds and debt, redevelopment, economic development, local government agencies and local government omnibus acts are included. These sections were selected as having the greatest interest to finance officers. # 2000 IRS Mileage Rate

Effective January 1, 2000, the mileage rate for business use of an automobile will increase to 32.5 cents. This replaces the 1999 rate of 31 cents per mile. The announcement can be found in Revenue Procedure 99-38 in *Internal Revenue Bulletin 1999-43*, dated October 25, 1999.

## E-Mail Group List Lost in Cyberspace

Even the internet experiences some bad days. The majority of CSMFO members on the group e-mail list were for some inexplicable reason dropped in late November. Thanks to an alert from members who had posted messages on the list which were rejected, the problem was promptly identified. Kirk Biglione, CSMFO's technical consultant, quickly responded and was able to restore the e-mail addresses of over 400 members who signed on via the CSMFO website. So the service is once more available to members.

However, some members may not have been restored in the process. Individuals who subscribed via an e-mail message to the Listserve were not posted onto a list database, and therefore may no longer be on the group list. If you have not received messages from the CSMFO members list since November 30, you will need to resubscribe. The best way is to go to the website (www.csfmo.org) and click on "Internet Mailing List" on the left sidebar. By using the website, your name and address are added to the database which can be used to restore the list if a similar list problem occurs. If you do not have access to the internet, you may still send a message to listserv@csmfo.org with the message subscribe members <your e-mail address>.

This incident should serve as a reminder to all subscribers. If you receive an posting error message from the listserve program, you can send a reply message, the problem will be examined and a response will be sent to you. If the error message indicates that the server was unable to deliver the message to another individual on the list, the administrator will also be alerted and will make necessary corrections. CSMFO is pleased to offer the group e-mail list to its members and want to ensure the smooth efficient operations of the system.
