## President's Message

Bill Statler, Financial Director, City of San Luis Obispo

It never occurred to me that a November message would be focused on the State's budget process and its impact on local government: it's either way too early or much too late. But (and here come the three toughest words in the English language): I was wrong. The Governor is now projecting a budget gap of \$8 to \$14 billion in 2002-03, and he has directed State agencies (with some exceptions) to prepare 15% expenditure reduction options. Unfortunately, the VLF backfill is already being viewed as a potential target with an article appearing in the Los Angeles Times on October 26.

# **Chapter Corner: Inland Empire**

Our chapter has had a successful program year with several interesting speakers and good attendance. Not only do we appreciate the participation and support of the Inland Empire cities' finance officials, but also our friends and associates who provide important services to us and to CSMFO, including consultants, accounting firms, banks and other financial institutions.

The Program year began January 18<sup>th</sup> with an outstanding presentation by Tom Breitkreuz, Special Districts Manager for the City of Moreno Valley. Tom spoke on the subject of "Special Districts Administration: New Laws and Challenges," and being an excellent juggler as a side hobby, Tom was able to explain the intricacies of Community Facilities Districts and assessment districts management using his trade. Besides being a juggler, Tom is also a

well-known clown in the Moreno Valley area, entertaining children at elementary schools and special events. But Tom did not suit up for the part at the January luncheon, because as we all know, Mello-Roos District workouts are no laughing matter.

For the March 15th Chapter meeting, the presentation switched from special districts financial issues to financial systems. Rowan Miranda, Director of Research and Consulting for the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA), spoke on "Emerging Technologies: ERP and eCommerce in Local Government." Dr. Miranda, formerly the Budget Director for the City of Pittsburgh and Chief Financial Officer of Allegheny County, gave a timely and interesting overview of the current environment, including the rise of enterprise resource

planning systems, the latest technological advancements in the field of public finance, and the challenges facing local government financial officials.

Tom Johnsen, Principal with Fieldman, Rolapp & Associates, was the Chapter's May 17th speaker. Tom, who has over 20 years of experience in public finance and has participated in over 150 separate tax-exempt financings, spoke on "Evolving Issues in Electronic Disclosure" relative to issuing debt. He gave some excellent advice to finance directors and their staff to follow and avoid serious penalties for non-disclosure. This was a very enlightening presentation. Those in attendance walked away with a checklist of items to consider and

We are again approaching the December 10 deadline for submission of the Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports (CAFR) by cities to the CSMFO Financial Reporting Awards program. As the Vice Chair of the Professional and Technical Standards Committee, I am requesting your assistance in reviewing a CAFR. This is an excellent opportunity to get involved for the first time or to continue your ongoing outstanding support of the CSMFO.

In mid-December 2001, the FY 2000-2001 CAFRs will be distributed for review along with comments from the prior year, the review checklist, and the application supplement.

If your City or organization has received the CSMFO Financial Report Award, you are encouraged to volunteer at least one reviewer for the program. If you have a preference to review more than one CAFR, please also indicate that to us.

This is a great way to get involved in the CSMFO organization, and there is no limit on how many reviewers will be allowed to participate in this process. We received interest from many people last year, after the review process was



complete, who wanted to participate as reviewers this fiscal year, and this is now your chance.

The sides are already lining up. Following a meeting between the Governor and legislative leaders, the L.A. Times reported that Senate President Pro Tem John Burton suggested the VLF reduction be eliminated, thus taxpayers would pay the full VLF and local governments would be kept whole .- Republicans are reluctant to "increase taxes" and have indicated they may fulfill earlier promises to preserve state funding of the backfill. Under the pressure to balance the budget, some legislators may feel the promise is no longer valid. The concern is that this won't be discussed publicly at all, and—as with many other State takeaways in the past—the decision will be made late in the process and late at night, when it will be too late for us to launch credible opposition to it. (As a strategy, this is probably great politics, but it's lousy public policy.)

So, we need to be out-front on this issue. This means beginning to take steps now to derail any serious consideration of a VLF-grab. The League and other local government associations are rallying members to action. As this newsletter is going to print, the League is mailing an action alert to city officials outlining the steps they should take and providing some background materials. (A copy of the memorandum is attached to active members' newsletters. Background materials may be found on the League website at www.cacities.org.)

The City of San Luis Obispo has already sent a letter to the Governor and our State Legislators setting forth the importance of VLF in funding critical City services, and how damaging a VLF-grab would be in our ability to deliver public safety and other essential

services. This is especially true as we grapple with our own local fiscal problems. (And for this reason, any State takeaways would be "double-whammy.") It also states how damaging this would be to the State's credibility, given its past assurances about the VLF backfill. On a Brighter Note: Great Conference Coming Up in February 2002. While the adjoining article covers the outstanding conference coming up in San Diego on February 20-22, I wanted to take this opportunity to underscore what a great learning experience this will be (and to end my message on a more positive note than the trials and tribulations of the State budget process!).

ensure that their continuing disclosure reporting procedures are in order.

The July 19th speaker was Sarah Miggins, Vice President of the Inland Empire Economic Partnership (IEEP), and liaison to several IEEP programs and committees. Sarah spoke on "The Role of IEEP in Economic Development." The IEEP serves as the clearinghouse of regional economic thinking, networking and action. Sarah provided an excellent discussion on the IEEP's mission and her responsibilities of attracting, creating and retaining business in the Inland Empire in order to increase the region's growth and economic output.

Our September 20th speaker was Dick Larsen, Treasurer-Tax Collector of the County of San Bernardino. Dick's topic was "Investment Pool Management: Pitfalls and Successful Strategies." Dick is responsible for the day-to-day management of the county's \$2 billion investment pool, and sits on the board of directors for the San Bernardino County Retirement Association, which has a fund size of \$3.6 billion. He discussed a number of concerns for investment pool managers, including relationships with brokers, the importance of analyzing and understanding cash flow trends, and safeguarding investments.

The Inland Empire Chapter will conclude its 2001 program year on Thursday, November 15th. The chapter meets bi-monthly on the third Thursday of the month from 11:30 until 1:00 P.M. at the Cask n' Cleaver Restaurant in Riverside. Sales tax revenue is the most important source of income for many local communities. Assembly Bill 990 is City-sponsored legislation intended to protect and enhance local sales tax revenues by establishing a statutory framework for cooperation between the Board and city and county governments. As a result, the Board of Equalization has been working with representatives of both the League of California Cities and the California State Association of Counties to develop a program to assist in ensuring that the local portion of the sales tax is credited to the proper jurisdictions.

The resulting program is "Let's Link Together—the AB 990 Process." This program, which is the culmination of months of planning and discussion, represents the first-ever formal direct contact, working arrangement between the Board and the local city and county governments of California. The program is primarily based on data that is currently captured by local governments in business licensing activities. In short, all requests are communicated electronically via a program/template that is sent to the respective municipalities' Board office. It works on most computer operating systems and is provided by the Board of Equalization. In most cases, the response turn-around should be 30 days or less.

The expected long-term benefit of this program is two-fold, each equal in its importance. Firstly, it provides the opportunity for a solid relationship to be built between the local Board offices

and the local governments. Secondly, it results in a more effective and efficient way for local jurisdictions to obtain answers and actions to local tax questions and discrepancies. AB 990 provides the framework for an association to be built; the result of which is a cooperative working arrangement which enhances the shared goals of all parties – the efficient review, posting and correction of local tax records.

To measure the program's success, it is important to achieve majority participation by the more than 500 city and county governments of California. All the parties involved in developing the AB 990 program believe that AB 990 presents a real opportunity to create an enduring practical working relationship that is effective and fruitful for both sides. Board representative will be working in the future to contact those local governments in their jurisdictions. Participation by municipalities is voluntary, and to sign up for the program a local jurisdiction is encouraged to contact a Board office for further information, or call the Board's Information Center and they will direct your call (1-800-400-7115). So "let's link together" and work towards a partnership in local tax issues.
