President's Message

Laura M. Nomura, Riverside Public Utilities

"The achievements of an organization are the results of the combined effort of each individual." – Vince Lombardi

I had the pleasure of serving as the 2012 President of CSMFO in its 55th year of promoting excellence in financial management through innovation, continuing education and the professional development of our membership throughout California.

In the capacity as your President this past year, I have had the incredible experience of support and commitment from so many colleagues throughout the association. The work program and accomplishments outlined in the Annual Report could only be achieved with very competent and collaborative team efforts by an incredibly talented Executive Committee, Board of Directors, Committee Chairpersons, Committee Vice Chairs and Members, Chapter Representatives, and our Executive Director and her administrative staff at Smith Moore & Associates.

Following are just some of the major accomplishments for 2012:

- (February 2012) CSMFO produced one of its highest attended conferences at the Disneyland Resort Hotel, with over 880 government and commercial attendees. The annual conference provided vast array of educational and networking opportunities for our members and sponsors.
 - Among the education sessions offered were two pre-conference sessions: "Budget Development Best Practices" and "Stepping Forward The Role of the Finance Officers in Today's Changing Market." Dr. JP Pawliw-Fry opened the conference with his keynote address on "Being Your Best When It Matters Most"; and Michael Coleman provided the general membership with an update on statewide issues. The conference closed on Friday afternoon with a keynote address from Christopher Thornberg, of Beacon Economics, on "Recovering from the Recovery."

As you will note on the financial portion of this report, the conference was well within budget and subsequently provided an economic return in the final net income of approximately \$102,000 which will go towards training programs and other services offered by CSMFO.

- (October 2012) Held a strategic planning workshop. In summary, the strategic objectives for 2012-2013 are as follows:
 - Training and Delivery
 - Training and development
 - Boosting chapters as a focal point and delivery vehicle
 - Membership and Participation
 - Marketing CSMFO membership to non-participating agencies
 - Expanding pool of CSMFO volunteers
 - Chapters as a local or regional point of connection
 - Financial Stewardship
 - Identifying and reviewing cost-saving efficiencies
 - Increasing revenues to support member benefits

CSMFO is entering year three of its Three-Year Strategic Plan. Being in the final year, we evaluated what might have changed since implementing our plan that we didn't anticipate; what needs does this create for our members and what new hopes or vision do we have for CSMFO. Many issues were discussed including demands on our membership resulting from decisions made by the state; upcoming changes with GASB; the need for finance professionals to be multifaceted; concerns over our agencies future fiscal sustainability; more public inquiries, etc.

For the future, the leadership of CSMFO all agreed that we need to continue to address and deal with the critical needs where CSMFO can provide distinctive value. Our annual strategic goals and objectives should continue to include: continued evaluation and enhancement of our training programs; responsiveness to changes; expanding our understanding of CSMFO's diverse membership and what's of particular value to them; connect with our commercial members to get the best information out to local government finance professionals; and lastly, develop guidelines for best practices for the profession.

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President's Message continued

Other notable accomplishments during the year:

- (January 2012) CSMFO began helping to market CalCPA Education Foundation courses, and in exchange CSMFO receives 20 percent of the revenues from attendees that are members of CSMFO, but not also members of CalCPA.
- (April 2012) The Board received an unqualified (clean) opinion on the 2011 audit, and filed it appropriately. Additionally, the board appointed the Executive Committee to also act as the Audit Committee with the Administration Committee.
- (June 2012) CSMFO generated a new MiniNews format, effectively shorting the publication to directly link to entire articles, as well as linking to advertiser's websites.
- (June 2012) CSMFO streamlined the process for the Budget Award program to encourage electronic filing by our members.
 In addition, CSMFO replaced its current Innovation in Budgeting and Public Communication Awards, with a new, broader-based Innovation Award program.
- (December 2012) CSMFO renewed contracts with consultants Don Maruska and Michael Coleman, both three-year terms beginning January 1, 2013, and terminating December 31, 2015.
- (December 2012) CSMFO conducted a membership and conference recruitment drive to all of the non-members cities
 and special districts throughout California.

The Annual Report represents the cumulative efforts of your leadership team and the general membership's accomplishments of the past year. Please take a moment to review each section. In the Finance section, you will see the programs your resources enabled this organization to accomplish on an annual basis. Please review the varied activities of the regional chapters to see the wide range of training that takes place across this state on a monthly basis. Peruse the Committee and League Policy Committee sections to see what the appointed leadership of this organization is accomplishing throughout the year. You will be impressed, as I was, by the tremendous amount of work that is performed throughout the year, largely due to volunteer efforts.

I would like to conclude this message by again recognizing the leadership and all the many volunteers that assist in meeting the goals and objectives of CSMFO. The valuable contributions of our members and the excellence in our profession have helped this organization prosper. I encourage each or our members to consider getting involved either at a chapter, committee or board level. Each individual brings a unique perspective which makes us a diverse and well-rounded organization. It has been a privilege serving as your President and thank you for entrusting me with this amazing opportunity.

Past President Report

Scott P. Johnson, City of Oakland

Annually, the leadership of CSMFO, (Officers, Directors, Committee Chairs, Vice Chairs, Senior Advisors and Chapter Representatives) participate in a Strategic Planning Session. In December 2010, as President-Elect, I convened the Planning Session which was facilitated by Don Muruska, Director of CSMFO's Coaching Program and contracted facilitator. During that Planning Session, the leadership team developed a three-year Strategic Plan for 2011 through 2013, which was subsequently adopted by the Board. The three-year strategic objectives identified were under three broad categories:

- (1) Training and Delivery, through (a) training and development programs and events, and (b) boosting chapters as a focal point and delivery vehicle;
- (2) Membership and Participation, by (a) marketing CSMFO membership to non-participating agencies, and (b) expanding the pool of CSMFO volunteers;
- (3) Financial Stewardship, by (a) identifying and reviewing cost-saving efficiencies, and (b) increasing revenues to support member benefits.

In October 2011, we held our Strategic Planning Session for 2012 through the leadership of President-Elect Laura Nomura, facilitated by Don Muruska. During the Planning Session we identified the results of our 2011 objectives as well as opportunities for continued results in 2012 to continue the efforts identified in the three-year plan.

Over this past year, as Past President of the Board for the 2012 year, I was assigned the task of working with the Chapter Chairs and continuing the work on boosting chapters as a focal point and delivery vehicle. During year two, conference calls were convened with the Chapter Chairs. It is clear that a number of chapters are very active while others have been challenged to have more frequent meetings. During the 2012 year we had a total of 42 chapter meetings from February 2012 through January 2013. Great job and kudos to our Chapter Chairs, this is an increase of over 31 percent (10 meetings) from last year! We are very fortunate as an organization to have such dedicated and committed volunteers. It should be noted that our members can access our CSMFO website under Events to see any upcoming chapter meetings. In addition, we have a listing of each chapter and the Chapter Chair contact information if anyone would like to reach out to their Chapter Chair, if they have suggestions on topics, or if they have any questions regarding their chapter. To the Chapter Chairs, please welcome Laura Nomura with open arms as she transitions in 2013 as Past President assigned as liaison to the chapters.

In an effort to expand our connection to the Chapter Chairs, the Board has recently approved reinstituting a Chapter Chair breakfast during CSMFO's Annual Conference. The Chapter Chairs have been invited by the Board to a Chapter Chair breakfast scheduled for February 21, 2013, during our conference in Oakland. This will provide a further opportunity for the Chapter Chairs to network, share experiences and brainstorm on ways to continue to engage our membership at the local chapter level.

In closing, I would like to thank the Executive Committee, Committee Chairs, Vice Chairs, 2013 Host Committee, and all members of CSMFO, for your participation in achieving the objectives of this goal and for all the support you have given me while I have been on the Board. As we move ahead in 2013, I also want to extend my support and appreciation to our President, Laura Nomura, our President-Elect, Pauline Marx, the Board, Committee Chairs and members, Chapter Chairs, and the membership for the opportunity you have given me to serve this great organization. I am confident that the leadership will continue with our 2013 President, Pauline Marx, President-Elect Pamela Arends-King, Past President Laura Nomura and our new and continuing board members.



About CSMFO

While CSMFO is largely a volunteer organization, we also contract for administrative and other services as needed. We could not, however, be as successful as we are without the dedication and assistance of finance professionals like you who volunteer your time to strengthen municipal financial management throughout the state.

The following is a summary of how CSMFO is organized and how the delivery of high quality, affordable services is accomplished.

Board of Directors:

CSMFO is governed by a nine-member Board composed of three officers – President, President-Elect and immediate Past President – along with six at-large Board members (three from Northern California and three from Southern California), who are elected by active membership. The role of the Board of Directors is to set the course and direction for the organization. Since 1989, this has been accomplished at the Board's annual Planning Session or Goal-Setting Workshop. In recent years, this workshop has resulted in the adoption of goals and formal objectives with detailed work programs that clearly identify what we are going to do, who is going to do it, and when it will be accomplished.

Committees:

Much of the work of CSMFO is accomplished through seven standing committees: Administration; Career Development; Conference Site Selection; Membership Benefits; Professional Standards & Recognition; Program; and Technology. Each committee is led by a chair, senior advisor and at least one vice-chair. The President appoints these positions.

Chapters:

Regional chapters are the backbone of our organization. There are 20 chapters that meet on a regular basis and provide an opportunity for exchanging ideas, learning through technical presentations and discussing professional problems with colleagues. Each chapter elects their Chapter Chair who plans, coordinates and presides over meetings.

Contractual Services:

Although CSMFO is primarily a volunteer organization, we contract for services when we need specialized help or expertise. Smith Moore & Associates, Inc. was hired in 2009 to provide association management services. Meetings & Association Management Services, Inc., now under our management contract with Smith Moore & Associates, Inc., provides conference planning services. Don Maruska is contracted to manage our coaching program, and Michael Coleman is contracted as a local government consultant.










2012 Revenue




Annual Conference

The Administration Committee was very active during 2012. In addition to our regular standing monthly review of CSMFO's financials, the Committee was very active in a number of projects and initiatives this past year.

At the direction of the Board, the Administration Committee embarked on the initial development of a Request for Proposal for Coaching Program and Professional Development Services. Although the Board ultimately opted not to go out to bid for Coaching and Professional Development Services, the process of developing the draft RFP and engaging in related discussion at both the Committee and Board levels, provided a nice opportunity for clarifying discussions regarding CSMFO's professional services contracts and consultant services procurement processes.

The Administration Committee also conducted an annual review of current consultant contracts for 2012, including Michael Coleman – local government finance training and consultation, Don Maruska – coaching and professional development services, and the combined Smith Moore & Associates (SMA) – management services, and Meeting and Association Management Service (MAMS) – conference and meeting planning contract. The review included the completion of a consultant satisfaction survey with the CSMFO Board, Committee and Chapter and Vice Chairs, as well as the solicitation of contract status reports from each consultant. The results of the review were favorable and were reported to the Board in October. The Committee also initiated new three-year professional service agreements for Michael Coleman and Don Maruska, covering calendar years 2013 through 2015. The new agreements were approved by the Board in December.

The Committee finalized a review of the Policy & Procedure Manual, also known as the Administrative Handbook, which was approved by the Board in June. The last update prior to this year was in 2009, so there were many changes and amendments to the previous version. For anyone interested in learning more about how CSMFO functions, the Policy & Procedure Manual contains a wealth of information and may be found on the CSMFO website, under the "About CSMFO" tab.

The Administration Committee also interfaced in 2012 with CSMFO's independent auditors, Richardson & Company out of

Sacramento, in receiving the results of the annual audit for 2011, and culminating in a presentation to the Board in April. Of course, CSMFO received an unqualified audit opinion.

The Committee also embarked on a review of the Annual Conference Handbook. The review is now complete and a first reading of proposed changes were shared with the Board in January. We anticipate approval of the revised document by the Board in February.

Finally, for those of you who have either seen or are now using the CSMFO electronic signature promoting the 2013 Annual Conference in Oakland, working in conjunction with CSMFO staff, the Administration Committee was responsible for its creation this past year. Stay tuned for a second electronic signature for CSMFO business use between conferences, to be introduced after our Annual Conference in Oakland.

Ongoing Activities

To achieve CSMFO's mission statement of promoting excellence in financial management through innovation, continuing education and the professional development of our members, the Career Development Committee continue to offer one-day training, weekend training seminars, along with coaching webinars and hot topic calls to assist municipal staff and officers enhance their knowledge base. In addition, the Coaching Program continues to add value through one-on-one coaching and offering targeted topics through telephone panels and webinars.

For Calendar Year 2012, CSMFO was able to offer 11 one-day courses to over 240 participants across its three course offerings: Introduction to Government Accounting, Intermediate Government Accounting and Power of Fiscal Policies/Long Term Financial Planning. We appreciate the leadership and the knowledge of our instructors to provide this excellent training.

With guidance and strong support from the Career Development Committee, Don Maruska (Master Certified Coach) led the webinar/hot topic program to record participation of nearly 2,900 members through live presentations and web recordings both in hot topic calls and webinar format; a continued increase from last year. The 2012 program presented the following topics:

- Better Budget Models (webinar cosponsored with Cal-ICMA)
- · Productive Labor Relations (webinar co-sponsored with Cal-ICMA)
- How to Avoid and Survive Tax Audits
- Accounting for Dissolution of RDAs and Successor Agencies
- · Economic Development Beyond Redevelopment
- How to Effectively Forecast Property Tax Revenues
- Answering Your Questions About Pension Reform.

Through the leadership of CSMFO and Don Maruska, the Career Development Committee supported the first virtual chapter meeting. As a result, we were able to reach a larger audience on the event day to disseminate critical information to agencies that resulted from the elimination of RDAs.

In addition, CSMFO and Don Maruska supported the efforts of capturing live video from the Annual Conference to rebroadcast on its website for a subject area that is important to anyone interested on advancing their career. The subject was "So You Want to Be a Finance Director: Keys to Successful Interviewing."

The Annual Weekend Training, which alternates annually between locations in Northern and Southern California, took place in November 2012, in Pleasanton. The group is intentionally kept small to enhance the learning experience and ensure a more interactive session, and this year we had 30 participants. This year's session titles include Legislative Update, Investing in Public Funds, Ethics and the Finance Professional, Bond Financing, Financial Analysis and Reporting, Long-term Financial Planning, and Developing an Operating Budget.

Career Development Committee continued

2012 Board Strategic Goals

The Board meets annually to develop strategic goals to deliver value to its membership. For 2012, Career Development Committee was assigned the following goals.

Determine appropriate content delivery approaches for sustainable, quality programs

Committee members developed a SWOT analysis for the introduction and intermediate courses that show the courses are appropriate, and the course evaluations reflect positive comments from the participants. In addition, a summary of revenues and expense was prepared to show that generally these programs along with Fiscal Policy do provide net income to the organization. From this review it was determined to be sustainable; CSMFO must maintain minimum class size and cancel if they are not met.

Develop Training Page presenting a portfolio of services offered, ties to resource matrix, and links with training partners (CMTA, CDIAC, GFOA)

The Training Page outline has been developed and incorporates comments by Committee members. Committee members have developed content and seek to update the 2007 Resource Matrix. This information has been shared with the Technology Committee to work on the update.

Increase focus on growth of leadership skills

The growth of leadership skills has a two-prong approach: sessions at the Annual Conference and re-invigorating the Coaching Program. Program Committee continues to build sessions into the Annual Conference that focus on development skills for finance professionals from "So you want to be a finance director" to new sessions that will perhaps focus on more interview/resume skills. For the Coaching Program, Committee members have worked on developing the coaches list, and sharing information and resources to the coaches.

Increase outreach to educational institutions

Committee members are reviewing this goal to determine the next steps to achieve this stated goal.

Develop cost and revenue models for programs and examine opportunities to recover costs, consider seed funding and sponsorships

Committee members discussed considerations on a revenue model and how certain programs should be considered as part of the membership fee (webinars, hot topic calls) and other direct programs (intro, intermediate, fiscal policy) should be charged a separate fee. To ensure that current programs do recover costs, class size minimums have been established. In addition, a couple of commercial members expressed interest in sponsoring webinars. Several Committee members met to discuss this goal and discuss the potential for these sponsorships and the impact to the overall organization.

CSMFO has also benefitted from our new relationship with CalCPA and has earned approximately \$3,000.

Expanding pool of CSMFO Volunteers: Reinvigorate the 1-1 Coaching Program to strengthen networking and build a cadre of future leaders in the profession and for the CSMFO organization

Committee members have outreached to each chapter to have at least one volunteer to add to the Coaches gallery. Through this effort, we have added to our list of volunteer coaches and have 27 confirmations. An email was sent to each coach reminding them of the available resources on the website. Committee members have also discussed ways to engage current volunteer coaches by developing emails and future mini-news articles to introduce them to the CSMFO organization.

During the 2012 year the Professional Standards & Recognition Committee focused on completing the transition of the CSMFO awards programs to a fully online application process. In July a fully online application system was deployed that has almost completely eliminated the need for paper budget documents to be mailed and substantially reduced the costs associated with the program. Those that still wish to submit paper budget documents can continue to do so for a slightly higher fee.

Following the successful implementation of the online application system, the Committee focused its attention on a redesign of the budget awards scoring system, which will be presented to the Board in February with the intention of implementing the changes for the 2013 or 2014 awards program. These changes should make the review results more meaningful for the applicants and decrease the scoring variability that has been a challenge for consistency in the past.

Lastly, the Committee critically evaluated the existing awards program and made the decision with the Board's concurrence to retire the Public Communications and Innovation in Budgeting Awards. Both awards had seen a decline in applications and had suffered from a lack of strong purpose and focus. The Committee then rolled out the first annual CSMFO Innovation Awards program for 2012 to provide a more meaningful and broadly applicable award opportunity for the membership. The Innovation Award can be awarded to a member agency for any program they believe to be innovative. A Committee of five reviewers will review each application and reach a consensus to grant the award to one to three applicants each year. The first Innovation Awards will be granted at the 2013 Annual Conference in Oakland following a strong showing in the first year's applications.

Committee Goals for 2013

For 2013, the Committee intends to continue its efforts to implement thoughtful changes to the system utilized to score the awards program. Efforts will also continue to bring new energy to the CAFR awards program and to identify how this program may be of greater benefit to the CSMFO membership. Lastly, the Committee will work towards implementing the strategic goals identified at the recent Board planning retreat, which for this Committee primarily focus on providing an online vehicle for the uploading, dissemination, and discussion of helpful information for the membership such as report and agreement templates, best practice concepts and survey data.

The 52nd Annual CSMFO Conference, Soarin' Over California, was held February 29-March 2, 2012, at the Disneyland Hotel in Anaheim, California. Registration for the conference was 922, which exceeded expectations of the Host Committee.

Two pre-conference sessions were offered and were well attended:

- CDIAC, CSMFO and CMTA Presents, Stepping Forward: The Role of the Finance Officer in Today's Changing Market This
 session was comprised of three sessions with different speakers for each session addressing topics of Fiscal Stress and
 Personal Liability for Local Government Officials, The Economics of Good Decision Making and Transparency and an Issuer's
 Commitment to Reporting and Disclosure.
- Budget Development Best Practices presented by Mike Mucha from GFOA.

The conference format, as usual, offered 30 concurrent sessions over the three days, with a variety of topics and speakers from which to choose.

The conference opened on Wednesday with keynote speaker, Dr. J.P. Pawliw-Fry, talking about *Being Your Best When It Matters Most*.

League Policy Committee Appointee Reports

Administrative Services Policy Committee

Chu Thai, Finance Director, City of South Pasadena

The Administrative Services Policy Committee reviews election law and administration, insurance and tort reform, open meeting law (the Brown Act), the Public Records Act, the Political Reform Act and other conflict of interest laws, and regulation of smoking and tobacco products. In 2012, the Administrative Services Policy Committee discussed and/or voted on the following issues:

- Proposition 31. California Forward initiative, "The Government Performance and Accountability Act"
- FPPC Update by the City Attorney's Department on issues of simultaneous meetings, city disincorporation, ethics training disclosure, posting of agendas as defined by the Brown Act, open meetings, financial interest of public officers, etc.
- Legislative proposal to clarify effective date of citizen initiatives
- Review of Administrative Services Committee Work Program
- Discussion on Potential Legislation

Community Services Policy Committee

The League's Community Services Policy Committee had a very active year. During 2012, much of the focus of each committee meeting was briefings on issues related to the demise of Redevelopment, legislation proposing "clean-up" language to ABX1 26, start-up of Successor Agencies and monitoring the State budget process.

The Committee was briefed on State budget cuts to funding for local library services. A representative of the California Library Association detailed the loss of \$30.4 million in library funding, impacting the funding for the transfer of library materials between libraries statewide, reductions in funding for adult literacy programs and elimination of Public Library Foundation funds that directly support local libraries.

The Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) campaign sponsored by the California Center for Public Health Advocacy remains a major focus of the Committee. The Committee voted to recommend that all Community Services Policy Committee members pursue participation in the HEAL campaign by the cities that they represent. The HEAL program promotes adoption of policies that have been crafted to improve and promote their communities' physical activity and retail food environments. Supporting healthy choices is essential to address the obesity epidemic among California's children and adults. Information is available at www.HealCitiesCampaign.org.

The January meeting included a presentation by the Mayor Pro Tem from the City of Irvine discussing the City's focus on their program promoting "Healthy City Healthy Planet." The City has created a concept for the integration of multiple practices into all aspects of City planning and the delivery of municipal services. Irvine is actively supporting the health of the City, their citizens and the planet on a daily basis. The Healthy City Healthy Planet initiative is an affirmation of Irvine's long-held commitment to health, fitness, well-being and the sustainability of our community. The webpage (www.cityofirvine.org/healthycity) integrates 100 relevant categories, descriptions and links that support Irvine's Healthy City Healthy Planet initiative. A well-balanced community is a successful community!

The Committee developed a two-year work program that addresses a wide range of Community Services issues. This work program is detailed on the League's website, www.cacities.org. This work program resulted in a very active year for the Community Services Policy Committee. I appreciate the opportunity to represent CSMFO on this Committee during 2012, bringing the financial perspective of cities to the policy and program discussions.

This Committee is charged with reviewing and recommending policy to the League of California Cities Board of Directors on issues related to revenue and taxation. There is a summary of Existing Policy and Guiding Principles that outlines standing policy direction for the Committee.

2012 League Strategic Goals

- 1. Support Sustainable and Secure Public Employee Pensions and Benefits
- 2. Promote Local Control for Strong Cities
- 3. Build Strong Partnerships for a Stronger Golden State

The League's Revenue & Taxation Committee met four times during the year and received presentations and addressed issues such as:

- Pension reform (Governor's 12 point plan) AB 340
- Next generation of economic development tools
- Streamlined sales and use tax agreement (SSUTA)
- The Government Performance & Accountability Act (Prop 31)
- · Cap and Trade auction proceeds
- · Local sales tax agreements
- League Resolution No. 1 Distribution of court fines, fees & assessments

The Revenue & Taxation Committee, along with the other League policy committees, received three special briefings prior to their regular meeting related to these topics:

- Redevelopment dissolution
- State budget 2012-13 (Prop 30)
- VLF litigation

At the time of each of these presentations and/or following, questions, discussion, and proposed positions were generated. Recommended actions were developed and approved to be submitted to the League's Board of Directors for their consideration. The Committee has also reviewed and made recommendations on numerous legislative bills relating to fiscal issues during the year.

A significant amount of staff time and effort was needed to monitor actions by the Department of Finance relating to redevelopment dissolution.

Transportation, Communications & Public Works Policy Committee

Michael Matsumoto, Assistant City Manager/Director of Finance, Pico Rivera

The Transportation, Communications, & Public Works Policy Committee held three meetings in 2012 without a meeting at the annual conference. Several difficult issues were discussed during the year.

The 2012 League Strategic Goals were approved along with the work plan. High Speed Rail was added to the work plan in 2012. For High Speed Rail, the committee rejected a proposal that the High Speed Rail project be exempt from CEQA. The committee considered a proposal to exempt all transportation projects from CEQA, and the Committee agreed unanimously to oppose the exemption. The Committee also supported the visionary efforts of High Speed Rail, but we also support placing High Speed Rail and bond back on the ballot for voter reconsideration.

The committee discussed transit bus weight limits extensively. Currently, buses exceed weight limits, and buses cause considerable damage to streets. The transit operators pointed out that the weights have increased as new regulations (such as handicapped lifts) were adopted by the legislature. The committee supported AB 1706 which exempts buses from the weight limit until December 31, 2015, while the issue is studied.



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
