- o 2013 US AG Issues Cole Memo Guidelines
- 2014 Congress defunds DEA Prosecutions
- O 2015 CA Adopts (MMRSA/MCRSA)
- 2016 Proposition 64 Passes in November 2016



• 23 square miles







Surrounded by a sea of agriculture









- January 2016 Ordinance To Regulate Cannabis
 - Permitted a limited number of commercial cannabis businesses
 - Prevent nuisance conditions
 - Provide effective controls
 - Enable medical cannabis patients to obtain cannabis from safe sources
 - Provide appropriate permitting and revenue for the City
- November 2016 Election Cannabis Business Tax









City Finances

- January 2016 Ordinance
 - Permitted a limited number of commercial cannabis businesses
 - 1. Cultivation facilities
 - Manufacturing facilities
 - Delivery services (retail sale only by delivery (no store))
 - Dispensary (retail sale out of a store)









- January 2016 Ordinance
 - Prevent nuisance conditions
 - Provide effective controls
 - Enable medical cannabis patients to obtain cannabis from safe sources









- January 2016 Ordinance
 - Provide appropriate permitting and revenue for the City
 - Requires a City of Salinas business license
 - Comply with all applicable provisions and requirements of that license









- November 2016 Election Cannabis Business Tax
 - Cannabis Business Tax Ordinance established
 - Business categories
 - Medical cannabis cultivation
 - Medical cannabis manufacturing
 - Medical cannabis delivery service
 - Medical cannabis dispensary
 - Non-medical cannabis businesses
 - Rates for each category
 - ➤ General Tax 50% voter approval
 - Allow City to provide essential public services









- November 2016 Election Cannabis Business Tax
 - Cannabis Business Tax Ordinance established
 - > Rates for each category

	Business Category		
		Manufacturing	
		Dispensary	
	<u>Cultivation</u>	Delivery	
Initial rate for years 1-3	\$15 / sf.	5%	
After year 3	\$25 / sf.	10%	

Note: After the first 3 years, City Council may increase the business license tax up to \$25/sf. or 10% on gross receipts









- November 2016 Election Cannabis Business
 Tax
 - Cannabis Business Tax Ordinance established
 - Tax is due quarterly by the end of the month following the calendar quarter
 - >25% penalty plus interest if delinquent
 - Another 25% penalty if not paid within another month after first delinquent









- November 2016 Election Cannabis Business
 Tax
 - Cannabis Business Tax Ordinance established
 - Audit and examination of records and equipment
 - Keep records for three years









- November 2016 Election Cannabis Business Tax
 - Measure L
 - No campaign
 - Ballot language
 - Passed at 74.18%
 - ➤ Yes 27,454
 - ►No 9,557

 - Only one that did not pass










True Roadblocks to Banking











Its Still a Risky Business

- Banks are federally regulated and therefore, more vulnerable to facing federal charges, should they be found inadequately compliant.
- The federal Bank Secrecy Act requires banks to watch for Anti-Money Laundering (AML) law violations in customers' deposit accounts and requires them to file a Suspicious Activity Report (SAR) to FinCEN, an agency of the US Treasury, regarding a customer's suspicious or potentially suspicious activity.
- Failure to file a SAR can result in criminal and civil penalties, including incarceration for involved employees. Federal law technically says a bank is itself committing money laundering by accepting a deposit of money derived from the sale of marijuana.










Roadblocks To Banking











Traditional Perceived Roadblocks

- Stereotype of the Cannabis Operator
- The misconception that legalization will go away so just wait tell in crashes and don't waist time trying to bank it
- Personal beliefs are influencing moving progressively to make this work for the cannabis industry
- Fears that the black market will always play a role in the industry so do not be fooled by those portraying "Good Actors"









Other Issues to Consider

- Other customers Oh, you do business with them
 - Cash smells like weed employees do not want to touch it
 - Black market
 - They have been arrested or have been criminals for doing this activity
 - Danger to cash and customers
 - Bringing loads of money back and forth
 - Cole Memo Compliance
 - Banking Safety Act Requirements









Assess Your Banking Partners

- How is your current bank reacting to you allowing cannabis businesses in your community?
- How have they responded to you putting cannabis funds in their financial institution?
- Talk to your peers who do they bank with or how are they handling banking issues and what do they have to say?
- When you do a banking RFP do you ask them the question about there willingness to deposit cannabis taxes and fees?
- Look for a success story to build confidence in your bank

Knowing Your Cannabis Business (1 of 2)

- How is the businesses you are dealing with established today?
 - Collective/Cooperative
 - Holding Company/Ancillary Company
- Who does your cannabis business partner with as vendors?
 - Home growers today do business without a permit
 - These vendors will not be able to conduct business under MCRSA January 2018
 - Are all the commercial business they purchase or sell to permitted locally and will they be in a position to get permitted by the State









Knowing Your Cannabis Business (2 of 2)

- Know your clients, clients
 - Even if the cannabis business which is regulated by the City is clean their vendors may be not be such good actors
- For Profit or Not For Profit (AB 64)
- Regulator scrutiny
- Pressure for banks (bank employees personal liable for BSA violations)
- Reputation for banks

Understanding the Rules (1 of 2)

- Understanding the Rules
 - Relationship-FinCEN (Form 8300)
 - > Pertains to business or profession city is neither of these activities
 - Banking Safety Act
 - Risk-Prosecution and Fines, Consult with Legal Counsel
 - Trust-One "Bad Actor" can cause problems if not mitigated timely









Understanding the Rules (2 of 2)

- Confidence
 - Not driven by industry
 - Good consultant that understands the issues
 - Oversight
 - Management
 - Transparency is a must
 - Compliance is a must
 - Not being late on payments
 - Law Enforcement role in the regulation or oversight process









Collecting Taxes and Fees











Safe Banking Collection Process

- How do you accept payment from your cannabis businesses?
- Do you allow for them to pay by cash or other means such as electronic payments or cashier checks?
- How often do you collect the tax payments?
 - Annually
 - Quarterly
 - Monthly
 - Based on total tax liability









Safe Banking Collection Process (cont'd)

- How do they track cash
 - Internal controls
- Transparent to bank, City, but: confidentiality (bank laws)
- Reinforce
 - Willingness to work with City
- Timing when receipt close to when armored car comes
- Who needs to know and who has a right to know
 - Not everyone needs to know; keep it quite









Logistics of Collecting Payments

- Random drop off times
 - Three a week
- Keep relationship sure
 - Any concerns regarding
 - High level counterfeit machine
 - How are they accountable
 - sealed bag; include sealed in our bank; if it's short, then we need to change our process and it will cost the Company for that city service
 - Any concerns; how it is brought to you and when
 - Proper staffing to handle it
 - Backup receipt or same person









Logistics of Collecting Payments (cont'd)

- Procedure
 - Returns forms
 - Not timely
 - Incorrect or misrepresenting
 - Taking advantage of loopholes
 - Not following procedures
 - Fee
 - Delinquency
 - > Returned checks
 - Administrative procedures
 - Cash
 - Checks
 - How to handle large deposits (threshold)
 - Armored (free for multiple pickups)









Tracking of Product and Cash











How the Marijuana Industry is Shaping Our City Finances

Management Inventory Systems

- Do you requires a Point of Sale system?
- Are all your cannabis businesses using a tracking and trace software?
- What type of storage do they use to secure cash and product?
- How do they transport product and cash off-site
- Do they have security personnel present during business hours or after hours?
- What type of cash management security do they have, i.e. drop box or kiosk machines?
- What happens of there systems crashes? (MJ Freeway)









Conducting Due Diligence

- Conduct compliance reviews for a regulatory scheme
- Conduct compliance audits on financials
- Make sure that they are properly only doing business with legitimate vendors
- Validate they are not diverting products or cash to the black market
- Create redundancy of various functions to ensure accountability









City Finances

Selecting the Right Cannabis Auditor

- Who should do your audits-professional staff who have a clear expertise and understanding of the cannabis industry
- Do not use auditors that provide services to the cannabis industry
 - City could be in violation of Bradley Burns Act (Regulation 7056)
 - May soon violate confidentiality of Excise Tax reporting requirements
 - Will create "red flags" for law enforcement
 - Will reduce cooperation to assist in criminal investigations due to the risk of leakage of confidential information









Selecting the Right Cannabis Auditor

- Cannabis Industry can sue city for creating conflict of interest by allowing a third party firm that works for industry and government resulting from them allowing access to intellectual and proprietary information which can be shared with their competitors
- Creates distrust and willingness to cooperate with the local agency
